

PHYSICIAN ASSISTANT MASTER'S PROGRAM

The Accreditation Review Commission on Education for the Physician Assistant (ARC-PA) has granted Accreditation-Continued status to the York College, CUNY Physician Assistant Program sponsored by the York College, CUNY Accreditation-Continued is an accreditation status granted when a currently accredited program is in compliance with the ARC-PA Standards. Accreditation remains in effect until the program closes or withdraws from the accreditation process or until accreditation is withdrawn for failure to comply with Standards. The approximate date for the next validation review of the program by ARC-PA will be March 2028. The review date is contingent upon continued compliance with Accreditation Standards and ARC-PA policy.

PROGRAM FACTS

Mission

The York College Physician Assistant program seeks to recruit and educate students from diverse surrounding communities to become highly competent, compassionate, and culturally aware providers of excellent medical care to underserved urban areas. Incorporated in our mission is a priority on increasing access to medical professional education for racial and ethnic minorities, financially disadvantaged students, and first-generation college graduates. Our program is committed to providing strong support so that we may also expect high performance from our students. All students successfully completing the program are eligible to sit for the national PA board examination administered by NCCPA and will have completed a didactic and clinical curriculum emphasizing urban medical care.

The Program's commitment to Diversity

The York College / CUNY PA program recognizes Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion (EDI) as essential elements for excellent patient care. The following goals were developed to assist the program in its EDI efforts.

- 1. Recruit and retain a student population reflecting the ethnic, racial, and linguistic diversity of CUNY, as well as exceed the national average of underrepresented minorities among physician assistant programs in the country.
- 2. Serve as an engine of social and economic mobility for financially disadvantaged students by maintaining an affordable tuition and fee structure of at least 10% lower than the national average.
- 3. Produce a graduating class with at least 80% committed to working in the NYC metro communities (5 boroughs of NYC, Long Island, Westchester, surrounding cities of New Jersey, and Connecticut) to help address the healthcare needs of these diverse communities.
- 4. Recruit and retain a diverse faculty and staff
- 5. Provide all students, faculty, and staff with the needed resources and tools to ensure their sense of inclusivity; and personal and professional development.

The Profession

Physician Assistants (PAs) are health professionals licensed to practice medicine with physician supervision. They are qualified by graduating from an accredited PA training program and obtaining certification from the National Commission on Certification of PAs (NCCPA). Certified PAs can then seek licensure from the state where they seek to practice medicine.

Within the collaborative physician-PA relationship, physician assistants exercise autonomy in medical decision-making and provide a broad range of diagnostic and therapeutic services. The clinical role of physician assistants includes primary and specialty care in medical and surgical settings working in both rural and urban areas. Physician Assistant practice is centered on patient care and may include educational, research, and administrative activities.

The Nature of the Work

The PA elicits medical histories, performs complete physical examinations, performs and interprets various diagnostic tests, and formulates diagnosis and treatment plans. The physician assistant functions within the supervising physician's scope of practice and the level of experience and training achieved. An important component of PA practice is patient counseling and patient education. Physician Assistants practice in varied settings, including private medical offices, hospitals, clinics, and community health centers.

Physician Assistants practicing in New York State may write prescriptions for medications, including certain classes of controlled substances. Physician assistants provide services in various medical and surgical disciplines including, but not limited to family practice, pediatrics, internal medicine, obstetrics/gynecology, geriatrics, orthopedics, psychiatry, and emergency medicine. The physician assistant role requires the application of intelligence, compassion, sound judgment, critical reasoning, dedication to patients, and good interpersonal skills.

The Program at York

The PA Master's Program at York College has been designed as a 28-month upper-division program, requiring a bachelor's degree with prerequisite coursework. All graduates are awarded a Master of Science degree in Physician Assistant Studies.

Semester Schedules in the Program

The current Physician Assistant Master's Program at York College is a full-time, daytime, 28-month program that commences every fall.

The first five semesters (Fall, Winter, Spring, Summer, and Fall) are didactic and are mainly conducted in the Physician Assistant Program classrooms located in the York College Science Building, rooms SC113 and SC131.

The following four semesters (Winter, Spring, Summer, and Fall) are spent on clinical rotations at several assigned medical facilities consisting of hospitals and clinics. During clinical rotations, students may be "on-call", requiring an overnight stay at the clinical site. Students are required to follow the schedule assigned to them by the clinical site supervisor.

OUTSIDE EMPLOYMENT POLICY

Applicants to the Physician Assistant program must assess their ability to pay tuition, equipment expenses, book expenses, travel expenses, and other living expenses for themselves and their dependents for the full 28 months of the program. The program is rigorous, and students need to be aware of the reasons why **outside employment is strongly discouraged while attending the PA program:**

- Class and rotation schedules are subject to change on short notice.
- Classes are typically scheduled between 9 AM and 5 PM but may be scheduled earlier or later.
- Clinical rotations may require weekend or evening/overnight work.
- The small amount of free time PA students have is usually solely needed for study, rest, or recreation
- No accommodation is made in schedules or attendance policy for outside employment
- Students will not be allowed to rotate at a clinical site where they were employed to avoid any conflict of interest
- No consideration will be made for academic difficulties secondary to deficient preparation because of outside employment

The program also strongly discourages enrollment in any work-study program while attending the PA program.

ADMISSIONS REQUIREMENTS

Step 1: Determine Eligibility for Application:

- 1. Completion of a bachelor's degree with a cumulative GPA of 3.0 or higher
- 2. Open Houses/Information Sessions Current York students and transfer students are <u>strongly encouraged</u> to attend an information session. Contact the program's admissions coordinator for more information on scheduled information sessions. You can also check the York College website for upcoming Open Houses.
- 3. No grade below a "C" in any prerequisite course will be considered.
- 4. Grade Point Average (GPA) of **3.0** minimum in the following <u>2</u> categories:

Science Prerequisites

One Year of General Biology with Laboratory (Bio 201, 202)

One Year of Human Anatomy & Physiology with Laboratory (Bio 234, 235)

One Semester of Microbiology without Laboratory (Bio 265 or Bio 465)

One Year of General Chemistry with Laboratory (Chem 108, 109, 111, 112)

One Semester of Biochemistry without Laboratory (Chem 412, Chem 460, or Bio 412)

Overall CUM GPA

All College-Level Work including Post-Baccalaureate, Graduate, and Professional Programs

- 5. Students with a PA Program Science Prerequisite GPA of 3.0. or better; or whose Cumulative GPA is less than 3.0, may petition the Admissions Committee to be considered if they have evidence of consistent improvement in the last sixty credits. Consistent improvement is defined as a cumulative GPA of at least 3.0, calculated using grades for the last sixty credits taken. If you meet both these criteria (PA Program Science Prerequisite GPA of 3.0 and A GPA of 3.0 or better with the most recent sixty credits), you may submit a letter explaining the initial performance and subsequent improvement, along with your most current transcript.
- 6. In order to satisfy the behavioral science prerequisite requirement, you **must** have taken one semester of psychology and one semester of any one of the following: another psychology course or sociology or anthropology.
- 7. Statistics courses taken more than 8 years ago will not be accepted and must be repeated. The Human Anatomy & Physiology courses must have been taken within the previous 5 years from the time of enrollment. Other science prerequisite courses (Biology, Chemistry, Biochemistry, and Microbiology) taken more than 8 years ago will not be accepted. As an alternative to repeating the General Biology OR General Chemistry courses, applicants may demonstrate adequate content knowledge by successful completion of the CLEP (College Level Equivalency Placement) Exam. https://clep.collegeboard.org/exam. If an applicant has taken and passed the USMLE Step 1 within the last five years, they can be waived from repeating outdated science prerequisites (EXCEPT Human Anatomy & Physiology I & II). If an applicant has taken advanced placement chemistry and/or biology courses in high school, your AP scores within the last eight years can be used to fulfill the general biology and/or general chemistry prerequisite requirement. (Expired science prerequisites are factored into the science prerequisite GPA)

Upon applying to CASPA you can have up to 3 PA program prerequisite courses pending. Pending courses may include **1** science course **or** Statistics, not both, along with one or both behavioral science courses **and** any other courses needed for a baccalaureate degree. All pending courses must be completed by August 1st before the fall semester you will enroll into the program.

Sequences for pending prerequisite courses for the PA Master's Program

Sequence I: One science prerequisite and one or both behavioral science prerequisites

OR

Sequence II: Statistics and one or both behavioral science prerequisites

8. Completion of at least 500 hours of experience in a <u>direct</u> patient healthcare environment. Completion of 250 hours at the time of application and documentation of at least 500 hours is required at the time of enrollment. Clerical work is not considered health care experience. The program does not provide volunteer sites. Acceptable experience includes volunteer work or employment in hospitals, clinics, private offices, or extended healthcare facilities. <u>A separate letter on letterhead</u> must be uploaded to CASPA as proof of healthcare experience including contact information for your source. If your HCE hours are more than 3 years old you may be asked to complete some additional hours.

Step 2: Upload Application and Supporting Documents

1. PA Program Application via CASPA (Central Application Service for Physician Assistants) The York College PA Program's application can be found on CASPA's website https://caspa.liaisoncas.com.

Please follow all instructions and upload all necessary documents listed below to CASPA's website. [This application is separate and in addition to the York College/CUNY application.]

2. Current Resume

- **3. Official Transcripts**: All applicants must request to have their official transcripts from all colleges attended including all **CUNY schools** sent to CASPA's website.
- **4. Three Reference Letters (3 separate sources):** Preferred sources include professors, health care professionals, and employers. Please upload **original** letters presented on professional letterheads *Reference letters uploaded to CASPA must contain the contact number of the reference source.*
- **5. Personal Statement.** Please follow the instructions on the CASPA website.
- 6. Documentation of Health Care Experience: This should be a SEPARATE letter from any of the reference/recommendation letters. 500 hours are required (at least 250 hours to apply and at least 500 for admission into the program). 100 hours of virtual shadowing completed during the following semesters only Spring 2020, Fall 2020, and Spring 2021 are accepted by this program. A letter from the human resources department, a supervisor, a health professional being shadowed, or an administrator will suffice, but it must be on the letterhead of the organization or individual, clearly, stating <a href="https://pours.org/no.com/no.co
- **9. Applying to York College**: Applicants invited for an interview will be required to apply to York College.

On the day of your interview, you will need to bring a York College processing fee of \$75 by check or money order. After the interview, you will be able to submit your payment directly to the Admissions Department. For Virtual Zoom interviews, you will be given instructions on how to pay the processing fee via email.

A VERIFIED application has to be on file with CASPA NO LATER THAN December 1st

^{*} It is the applicant's responsibility to upload all required documents to CASPA's website. The PA Program faculty/staff are not responsible for obtaining any missing documents. You may contact the PA Program to track your application status. The PA Program also does not accept any hard copies of supporting documents. All supporting documents must be submitted through CASPA's website!

Bonus Points

The program gives bonus points to applicants who have taken and passed at least a 3 or more credits course at York College. The program also gives bonus points to applicants who have taken and passed at least 24 credits of courses at any one of the CUNY schools. E-permit courses can only be counted towards your home school credits. If you have ever served in the military you can also receive Bonus points as a veteran. If you think you qualify, you will need to show proof that you are eligible to receive the bonus points.

International Students

An applicant who is from a foreign country; where English is a second language and has obtained a degree from that country, must take the test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL). The passing grade for the TOEFL exam is 61 for the paper exam and 75 for the Internet exam. This exam has no expiration date.

All foreign applicants must have their foreign transcripts evaluated by Span Tran. To have your transcript evaluated by Span Tran you must press and hold the ctrl button. At the same time left-click the link below and you will be taken to the Span Tran page with instructions on how to have your foreign transcript evaluated. Span Tran is our recommended international transcript evaluation service. They have created a custom application for York College that will make sure the student selects the right kind of evaluation at a discounted rate. Once your transcript has been evaluated you must contact our Admissions Coordinator, Ms. Tenesha Spain, at tspain@york.cuny.edu

The PA Program does not accept any transfer credits from foreign transcripts. All PA Program prerequisites must be taken and completed at an accredited college in the United States. All international students must complete 400 of the 500 healthcare experience hours in the United States.

Advanced Standing

There is no advanced standing in the program, regardless of the qualifications or experience of the applicant. All candidates must complete the entire 28-month course of study.

Additional Information

- You do not have to apply to York College until you are invited for an interview. Therefore, if you
 are not selected for an interview, you will not be asked to apply to York College.
- Admission to the Physician Assistant Program is competitive, and applicants may be placed on a waiting list or denied even if all requirements for screening are complete.
- An interview before the admissions committee does not guarantee admission into the program.

Technical Standards

The following technical standards for admission establish the mental and physical abilities students need for successful completion of the Physician Assistant program and eventual PA practice. York College offers a variety of services, activities, and accommodations to students with disabilities, mainly through two offices- the Coordinator of Disability Services and the York Enrichment Services (Y.E.S) for Students with Disabilities. All students admitted to the York College Physician Assistant Program are expected to be able to perform the listed tasks, with or without reasonable accommodation. Every effort is made to provide reasonable accommodations to those students with documented disabilities.

- PA students must be able to sustain attention, reason, analyze, assimilate, and learn a large
 amount of information. Information from various disciplines and sources must be correlated and
 concepts applied to develop therapeutic plans and solve clinical problems in a timely fashion.
 The ability to extract valid, useful, and relevant information from medical literature is also
 required.
- PA students must be able to observe in lecture, laboratory, and clinical patient care settings. PA students must have adequate sensory skills to elicit medical histories and to perform complete physical examinations utilizing inspection, percussion, palpation, and auscultation including adequate vision, hearing, and tactile sensation.

- PA students must be able to communicate with patients in a sensitive manner and record and communicate patient information in a timely and effective manner to other members of the healthcare team.
- PA students must have adequate neuromuscular control to perform therapeutic and diagnostic
 procedures (such as blood drawing, suturing, casting, etc.), to respond to emergency situations,
 and to move about various healthcare environments. The didactic phase of the program
 requires extended sitting, in contrast to the clinical phase which requires extended standing and
 moving about various clinical facilities.
- PA students must be able to relate to and develop a good professional rapport with other
 members of the healthcare team. PA students must also maintain composure during periods of
 stress and respond appropriately to emergency situations. Recognizing limitations,
 demonstrating concern for patients, and exercising good judgment are also required attributes.

All students with a documented disability are encouraged to sign up in Room 1G02 (Tel. 262-2272) and take advantage of services provided by the Coordinator of Disability Services and the Y.E.S. program. These services include individual and group counseling; individual orientation and registration assistance; readers & interpreters; modified instruction and examination procedures; textbook loan program; assistance in the use of adaptive equipment and technology and coordination of disability-related accommodations.

Questions about the program's technical standards may be directed to the program director or the Coordinator of Disability Services. All information regarding disabilities is handled confidentially. All requests for accommodations are voluntary and must be made in writing prior to beginning coursework

Accreditation and Credentials

- 1. The ARC-PA has granted Continued Accreditation to the Physician Assistant Program sponsored by York College/CUNY. Continued accreditation is an accreditation status granted when a currently accredited program is in compliance with the ARC-PA Standards. Continued Accreditation remains in effect until the program closes or withdraws from the accreditation process or until accreditation is withdrawn for failure to comply with the Standards. The approximate date for the next validation review of the program by the ARC-PA will be March 2028.
- 2. The Master of Science in Physician Assistant Studies is conferred when the Physician Assistant Program requirements are fulfilled, including successful completion of all Physician Assistant Major Discipline requirements, in addition to all prerequisite requirements.
- 3. Certification: Upon completion of all requirements and approval by the PA program, the graduate is permitted to sit for the National Commission on Certification of Physician Assistants examination. No separate certificate is issued.
- 4. Licensure: Upon completion of all requirements, the graduate is permitted to apply to New York State for limited permit licensure as a physician assistant. The PA can apply for a full license upon taking and passing the National Commission on Certification of Physician Assistants (NCCPA) examination.

- No grade below a "C" in any prerequisite course will be considered.
- Statistics prerequisite courses taken more than 8 years ago will not be accepted and must be repeated. Anatomy & Physiology I & II taken more than 5 years ago will not be accepted and must be repeated. Science prerequisite (Gen Biology, Gen Chemistry, Bio Chem, and Microbiology) courses taken more than 8 years ago will not be accepted. These science prerequisite courses must be retaken to be considered. Alternatively, students may demonstrate continued competence in Biology 201 & Biology 202 OR Chemistry 108 & 109 and Chemistry 111 & 112 by successful completion of the CLEP Examination in Biology or Chemistry http://www.collegeboard.org/exams. If an applicant has taken and passed the USMLE Step 1 within the last five years, they can be waived from repeating outdated science prerequisites (EXCEPT Human Anatomy & Physiology I & II). If an applicant has taken advanced placement chemistry and/or biology courses in high school, your AP scores within the last 8 years can be used to fulfill the general biology and/or general chemistry prerequisite requirement.
- To satisfy the second semester of the behavioral science prerequisite requirement, you can take another psychology course **or** sociology course, **or** anthropology course.

^{*}Students taking Biochemistry at York College may be required to complete organic chemistry. Please see the Chemistry Department for more information.

Frequently Asked Questions

- Q: When does the program begin, and how many students are accepted yearly?
- A: The program begins every fall and we accept a maximum of 30 students per year.
- Q: How do I apply to the program?
- A: The York College PA Master's Program application can be found on CASPA's (Central Application Service for Physician Assistants) website https://caspa.liaisoncas.com. Once you have been selected for an interview, you will be asked to pay a \$75 York College processing fee. For Virtual Zoom interviews, you will be given instructions on how to pay the processing fee via email.
- Q: When does the program begin to accept applications and supporting documents?
- A: For the Fall 2025 cycle, prospective students may begin to submit their applications and upload their documents to CASPA's website from Thursday, April 25, 2024.
- Q: When is the application deadline?
- A: December 1st; applications must be verified by CASPA by 11:59 ET on December 1st. Applicants will be notified of acceptance decisions.
- *To ensure an application is verified on time, the application should be completed at least four weeks before the deadline*
- Q: Can I attend the program part-time?
- A: No, the Physician Assistant Program is a full-time, 28-month program. There is no part-time evening or weekend classes.
- Q: Can I upload my application and supporting documents to CASPA's website before I apply to York?
- A: Yes, that is the policy
- Q: What is the cost of the program?
- A: For tuition and fees information see pages 8 and 9 of the tuition & fees section of this brochure. You may also contact the Bursar's Office at 718-262-2186 or see http://www.york.cuny.edu/bursar/tuition-fees.html
- Q: Do you offer student loans?
- A: For student loan information you may contact Student Financial Services at (718) 262-2230, room AC-1M08 or go to https://www.york.cuny.edu/financial-aid, or https://www.york.cuny.edu/portal_college/01-search-report?SearchableText=&getDept=Student+Financial+Services
- Q: Do you have internship sites where I can acquire my healthcare experience hours?
- A: There is a new website called: http://pashadowonline.com/paso/ that tries to match up prospective PA students with PAs willing to be shadowed.
- Q: Do I have to complete all the prerequisites before applying to the program?
- A: No, you may be in the process of completing 1 science prerequisite or statistics, not both. You may also be in the process of completing the behavioral science prerequisites and courses to complete a bachelor's degree. You must complete all the prerequisites and obtain a bachelor's degree before the Fall semester that you will enroll in the program.

- Q: Are online courses satisfactory for your prerequisite requirements?
- A: Yes, as long as the online courses are from a known accredited college.
- Q: Do you accept statistics courses other than regular statistics ex: biostatistics?
- A: Yes, however, the program may need to review the course description for approval. If you are unsure that your course is acceptable you can send us your course description via email to pacoursereview@york.cuny.edu. The course will be reviewed and a response sent at that time.
- Q: Do you accept any type of psychology course to fulfill the psychology prerequisite requirement?
- A: Yes
- Q: Does the program accept transfer courses from professional or medical programs?
- A: No, the program follows the York College policy of not accepting courses from professional or medical programs.
- Q: If I completed the didactic year of a PA Program at a different school; will your program accept my PA Program courses?
- A: No, the Program under no circumstances accepts any courses from another PA Program.
- Q: I took organic chemistry and did not realize I had to take biochemistry. Can I substitute organic chemistry for biochemistry?
- A: No, the program does not allow any substitutions for any of the science prerequisite courses.
- Q: Will all of the science courses I have taken be included in my science GPA?
- A: No, only the PA Program's 8 science prerequisite courses including all repeats and expired science prerequisite courses.
- Q: Is the GRE required for this PA Program?
- A: No
- Q: Does the program accept pass/fail grades for the science prerequisites?
- A: No, unless the courses were taken during the Spring 2020, Fall 2020, or Spring 2021 semesters.
- Q: Does the program accept virtual shadowing hours as a healthcare experience?
- A: No, unless the hours were completed during the Spring 2020, Fall 2020, or Spring 2021 semesters, the program will accept 100 hours.
- Q: Does the program offer any scholarships?
- A: No, however, you can check with the college's scholarship office at Scholarships@york.cuny.edu
- Q: Can you be accepted into the PA Program if you are not a citizen or permanent resident of the United States?
- A: Yes. The York College PA Program does not exclude students based on immigration status. Students eligible for acceptance to CUNY are eligible to apply. However, because PA students rotate at clinical sites that require background checks and would need to obtain licensure before

- being able to practice medicine, a valid social security number is required for such purposes
- Q: Can you take the certification exam if you are not a citizen or permanent resident of the United States?
- A: Yes. You may be eligible to sit for the exam if you graduate from an accredited Physician Assistant Program and meet all other requirements set forth by the certifying agency. You can get additional information by visiting NCCPA's website at https://www.nccpa.net/
- Q: Can you work or practice as a Physician Assistant if you are not a citizen or permanent resident of the United States?
- A: Yes. State law requirements vary. It is strongly encouraged to seek legal help on such matters. The CUNY Citizenship Now office may also be helpful: https://www.cuny.edu/about/administration/offices/communications-marketing/citizenship-now/
- Q: What type of college degree will I acquire after I graduate from the program?
- A: Students who graduate from the PA program receive a Master of Science (MS) degree in Physician Assistant Studies.
- Q: Can students who graduate with their BS in Physician Assistant Studies at York come back to complete the MS program?
- A: No, this will not be possible since, with the transition, many of the PA courses offered for the BS will also be offered for the MS program.
- Q: Can I update my application after it has been verified by CASPA?
- A: Yes, you can update your application until the current CASPA cycle closes in March.
- Q: How many times can an applicant apply to our PA Program?
- A: You can reapply twice with the option of petitioning for a third chance.

Please note: Interviews for the Fall class will commence in the preceding <u>Fall into the Spring semester</u>. Applicants who have submitted a completed, verified application, all required documentation, and meet all the criteria for an interview will be called first. The program currently admits a maximum of 30 students per year and interviews will continue until the program officials deem it necessary. Every attempt will be made to notify candidates by March 31st

Notice to Students on Criminal Background Checks

Current laws generally permit a state licensing board or agency to deny a license to practice if the applicant has been convicted of a felony or other specified crime. Like many state licensing boards, the Office of the Professions of the New York State Education Department requires that a criminal background check be conducted prior to granting a license.

The Department of Health Professions at York College does not require a criminal background check for admission to our degree program, <u>but</u> the Department's educational requirements include placement at one or more hospitals or other off-campus clinical training sites, and these sites frequently require a student to undergo a criminal background check before the student can be placed for clinical training. If based on the results of a criminal background check, the site determines that a student's participation in its clinical training program would not be in the best interest of the site, the site may deny that student admission to the training program. Even if the student has already begun the placement when the results are received, the site may elect to dismiss the student, regardless of the student's performance while in the training program. Each clinical training site that requires a criminal background check sets its own standards and procedures, and you may be asked by the site to pay the cost of the background check. You may also have to complete more than one criminal background check during the course of the Health Professions at York College depending on the number of sites where you are placed and the requirements of each site.

Some clinical rotation sites may also require that students submit to a drug test as a condition of their participation. Students will be responsible for the cost of this testing. Refusal to have a test may result in an inability to complete the rotation and possibly the professional program.

Please note that if a clinical training site determines that you may not take part in its training program based on the results of a criminal background check or drug test (or due to refusal to submit to a drug test), you may be unable to complete your course requirements and to continue in the Physician Assistant Program. It is important for you to be aware of these requirements and consider them before enrolling in a program offered by the Department of Health Professions at York College, as York College has no obligation to refund your tuition or fees or to otherwise accommodate you in the event you are ineligible to complete your course requirements based on the results of a criminal background check, or if you are denied a license to practice.
